The interaction between wildlife and humans is inevitable, especially as suburban development continues. This program will discuss the various aspects of human-wildlife interactions. We will look at the many facets of humans dealing with nuisance wildlife. This includes things such as deer damage on crops and landscapes, nuisance goose situations, and coyotes in cities. We will also discuss options for dealing with the wide variety of nuisance situations that arise, including the laws that surround these options.

We will hear how rehabilitation of wildlife has grown over the years and how it impacts people. A variety of situations regularly arise in which humans need to deal with animals that need to be rescued or need medical attention. However, there are also situations in which the better solution might be to not do rehabilitation on an animal. We will investigate several of these situations and ways you can help wildlife.

Humans deal with wildlife diseases on a regular basis. Several of the most common diseases and status of these diseases will be discussed including rabies, bird flu and a new and emerging disease to the area called white nose syndrome in bats. Some wildlife diseases can have major health ramifications for people or pets and knowing what to look for will help in understanding how this affects humans.

WHERE: Aurora Parks and Audubon Sanctuaries in Aurora Ohio

MEET: Novak Audubon Sanctuary parking lot on Townline Road

Spring has started in earnest and we will be exploring several areas around Aurora Ohio that is home to several parks and sanctuaries. Many migrants should have arrived in NE Ohio by this date and many wildflowers will be in bloom. Since many of us have never visited these areas we are fortunate enough to be guided by Tracey Knierim. Tracey leads spring bird walks and flower walks in these areas. Her expertise should make for a very enjoyable day in the field. Be aware that some of the trails are primitive and proper footwear as well as clothing for the weather should be worn.

After birding in the morning, if weather permits, we plan to go on a wildflower hike at one of the best places in NE Ohio Eagle Creek. Tracey will lead us for this excursion also. Plan for a day of it, FUN that is, around Aurora. Need more info? Call Jim at 440-257-2507

DIRECTIONS: Take OH Rt. 306 south to Aurora. Turn left onto OH Rt.82 and follow till it makes a big curve. Townline Road goes off to the left only. If you come to Yogi Bear trailer park you have gone too far. When on Townline Road slow down, roll down your windows, go slow and listen or perhaps see Bobolinks, Meadowlarks or even a Grasshopper Sparrow in the open fields. About a mile or so there will be a gravel parking lot on the right side of the road...park there.

Spring migration is getting into full swing and we are going to "kick it off" with a trip to one of the "pearls" of northeast Ohio, Cuyahoga Valley National Park. This park covers 33,000 acres, we will just be visiting a "small" section but it should be "large" in birds. Warblers, vireos, thrushes, orioles and many other neo-tropic migrants will be heading north and stopping at this pristine area. Most people know of the tow path at Brecksville Station, but it is generally full of foot and bicycle traffic so we will find a quieter spot to look for the migrants at Indigo Lake. We may visit other areas as time and weather permit.

We will be guided by Doug Marcum who works for the Park as a Wetlands biotechnician. Doug has a BS degree from Kent State and has lived in NE Ohio all of his life. He has many fine photographs and a blog spot for anyone who may be interested. Photos at

DIRECTIONS: Take I-271 south to OH Rt. 8 (south) and exit at OH Rt.303. Go west to Peninsula Ohio and turn left onto Riverview Rd. (south) .Go about 2 miles or so to the gravel parking lot for Indigo Lake. It is just past Szalay's Farm and Bolanz Rd. If you pass the Beaver Marsh you have

Geauga Park District to Host Summer Picnic

Geauga Park District's Orchard Hills Park has a rich history that will unfold during Blackbrook Audubon's annual potluck/picnic scheduled for **6 pm on Tuesday, June 19 (with dinner at 6:30)**.

Pack your picnic basket with a favorite passing dish, your own table service and a beverage of choice and join in this special summer gathering. An ideal setting, delicious food and good company are the recipe for success, but as an added bonus, Nancy and Jim Patterson will share stories of their 5-generation history on this property and explain the vision that led to making this a unique gem in the Geauga Park District network of parks. Afterwards, picnickers are invited to lace up walking shoes for a guided hike over the gently



rolling trails to get a 1st hand look at some of the conservation efforts employed in transforming this former golf course into multi-use parkland.

The park entrance is just north of Patterson's Farm Market at 11340 Caves Road. Participants will picnic at the main shelter just off the parking lot. How many members out there saw the movie "The Big Year?" We have something similar called the Bird-a-thon. You can have a fun time watching the birds within a 24 hour period and at the same time help raise money for our Audubon Adventures program. Participate in the upcoming Birdathon May 12-May 20. You are able to pick the day and times during that 24 hour period to find as many species of birds that you can. Form a team or go solo, challenge other friends to see who can raise more money! We would like to thank everyone who participated in the monitoring project at Mentor Marsh/ Headlands Dune State Nature Preserve. As of February, we submitted 17 checklists with 134 species. Highlight of the checklist include 20 warbler species. The project will end on April 8, 2012 with our last walk!

GREAT NEWS! Blackbrook Audubon has decided conduct a seventh year of bird monitoring. We will be collecting data on **the birds that live or visit Mentor Lagoons Nature Preserve.** Adjacent to a marina, this unique, 450 acres of green space and nature and water trails features a mile and a half of wild beach and five miles of hiking trails that meander through a coastal forest and marsh.

We will be conducting <u>one bird walk a month for a year!</u> These walks will take place on **the 4th Sundays (8 A.M.)** Everyone who is interested in lending their eyes and ears, meet at the preserve parking area at **8365 Harbor Drive, Mentor, OH 44060**. The first bird walk at Mentor Lagoons Nature Preserve will start on **Sunday, May 27, 2012**.

Birdathon 2012

Birdathon 2012 will take place beginning Saturday, May 12 at midnight and end Sunday, May 20 at 6:00 p.m. We hope many of you will decide to participate. All funds raised in the Birdathon are used to benefit education!

What is Birdathon? Blackbrook members go out birding and ask people to pledge donations to support their efforts.

How do you participate? Grab your binoculars, line up a few sponsors, maybe find a friend or two and go out and see how many species of birds you can see in a 24 hour period during the above dates. You do not have to bird the whole 24 hours nor do the hours have to be consecutive as long as you're starting and ending times are no more than 24 hours apart. You could take a walk around your neighborhood before work in the morning and then go to a nearby park that evening. You can even bird in your backyard or watch your feeders through a window.

If anyone would like to join an existing team, check with me and I will try to match you up with someone. I personally will be out and about in Lake County one weekday that week (exact date depends on weather) and would love to have people join me for all or part of the time. Blackbrook Audubon has been leading this walk since the 1940's and is often the best one in the Cleveland area for number of species seen during this time frame.

Come prepared for the weather as this is a rain or shine (sometimes snow) event.

Remember that 90-95% of the birds we see in the entire year are seen during these six weeks so make your plans now to join us each week for great birding.

Don't let spring slip up on you unappreciated, get out and enjoy the changing seasons during one of Geauga Park District's free birding programs/walks listed below, or get reacquainted with woodland wildflowers, amphibians and other seasonal highlights detailed on the Park District Website.

April 13 - Evening Woodcock Watch! - The Rookery (7-9 pm)

Listen for the "peent" of the pudgy woodcock and witness his enchanting spring ritual dance. Frog calls, redwing maneuvers and other signs of spring are an added bonus as we await the twilight performance.

April 15-May 20 – Spring Bird Walks – (7:30-9:30 am)

See www.geaugaparkdistrict.org for locations of the six walks held in April and May so as to participate in a Greater Cleveland tradition since 1933. Seasoned bird watchers assist novices of all ages with observation and identification. Walks held rain or shine, except for thunderstorms and/or high winds. Dress for weather. Bring binoculars and bird guide or borrow one of ours.

April 19 - Nomadic Birder/Back Packing Southern

Africa – The West Woods (7:30-8:30 pm) Join University of Cape Town student and former Geauga Park volunteer, Ethan Kistler, as he shares his adventures from his four month backpacking trip through eight African countries. Last year he set out in search of rare and localized birds from South Africa to Tanzania!

May 20 – Coffee with the Birds – Swine Creek Lodge (10-11:30 am)

Participate in the last bird walk of the spring season, then join a naturalist for an "inside" look at bird watching as we enjoy sitting around our bird feeding station indoors with beverages and snacks. Stop by anytime during the program hours.

Headlands Dunes Bird Sit

Interested in going on a Blackbrook field trip or bird walk, but not willing to commit to a long walk? We have the ideal opportunity for you! On Sunday, May 20th, the last of the Audubon spring bird walks steps off from Zimmerman trail at 7:30 AM.

For those wanting a less strenuous group bird watching experience, come to the lawn near the picnic area at the far eastern side of Headlands Dunes State Park between 8:30 and 10:30 AM. We'll provide the coffee (the restrooms with flush toilets are nearby). You should bring your own chair, binoculars and a field guide if you have one, and we'll watch the birds come to shrubs and trees near us. The Dunes are a haven for warblers before they venture across Lake Erie in April and May. Bring a snack if you want and stay for as little or as long as you like. The birders starting at Zimmerman Trail will be strolling by about 9 AM. If you are interested, you can join the end of that walk.

The lawn area is near the parking lot. Plan to bring an umbrella in case of rain and dress warmly or bring a blanket, as the temperature may be "cooler near the lake". Headlands Beach State Park is at the northern terminus of State Route 44 (Heisley Road) in Lake County. As you enter the State Park, bear right along the access road all the way to the far eastern end, which is the Headlands Dunes State Nature Preserve. Turn into parking lot #1 and look for the Blackbrook Audubon banner.
