PROGRAM: "The Future for Birds

in a Changing Climate"

SPEAKER: Marnie Urso **TIME:** 7:00 p.m.

PLACE: Penitentiary Glen Nature Center

(Lake Metroparks)

Audubon scientists have been working on a detailed scientific study, based in part on Audubon Christmas Bird Count and Breeding Bird survey data, that quantifies the risk that climate change poses to North America's birds in a greater level of detail and clarity than anyone has been able to predict so far. We already know climate change is a very serious threat to our birds; this report provides details on which birds are most threated by climate change and where. This "field guide to the future" for birds under various climate change emissions scenarios will offer some important insights as to how we can use adaptation and mitigation strategies to lessen the impact of climate change on birds -- and people.

Marnie Urso has been working on environmental public policy in Washington DC and Ohio for the past 16 years. She has been with Audubon for 9 of those years and is currently the Senior Field Manager for the National Audubon Society. Most of her work has focused on Great Lakes Restoration and Climate Change. Marnie is based in Cleveland and enjoys birding with her family along the shores of Lake Erie.

PROGRAM: "Invasive Swine and Swan" **SPEAKER:** Craig Hicks, Caleb Wellman

PLACE: Meyer Center, Big Creek Park

(Geauga Park District)

Two animals introduced to the U.S. long ago clearly demonstrate the pitfalls of transferring wildlife outside their natural range. Discover how these invasive species threaten Ohio's agriculture and ecosystems in a presentation by two biologists from the USDA, Craig Hicks and Caleb Wellman.

The first invited invader, a mammal brought here almost 500 years ago, now wreaks havoc in 39 states, when three decades ago it was only found in 17 states. Sometimes called a feral pig, wild boar or razorback, feral swine eat farmers' crops, damage habitat with their wallowing and rooting, carry at least 30 diseases and "hog" resources, such as acorns, needed by native wild turkey, blue jays and other wildlife. Feral swine are found in more than 20 counties in Ohio, including Ashtabula, and breed

in 13 counties.

OCTOBER ACTIVITY

Date: Sunday, October 19, 2014 **Activity:** Little Mountain Hike

Meet: The Holden Arboretum Visitor Center

Little Mountain—Past, Present and Future. This "mountain" may not tower over Lake County as its name suggests, but the slopes and cliffs that lead up to Little Mountain's 1,266-foot summit offer a unique tapestry of human and natural history.

There are few traces left of the 300-room hotels, woodland cabins and recreation facilities that once covered the peak, serving as a summer playground for the rich and famous of Cleveland for almost a century. The bustling activity of a resort has been replaced by a silent, towering forest of white pines and eastern hemlocks that one might expect to find in the wilds of upstate New York or eastern Canada, but not in Ohio.

In fact, almost everything about this area suggests a northern source, from the forest over our heads, to the quartz pebbles within the outcrops of Sharon conglomerate, to the soil under our feet, to the rare, delicate and sometimes inconspicuous ferns and wildflowers growing in joints and crevasses of the outcrop.

Join Pat Biliter as we walk the Little Mountain trail. Discover the rich natural and social history of Little Mountain.

October program continued:

Our second case, a bird released in North America in the late 1800's for a seemingly innocent purpose, first turned up in Ohio just over 100 years ago. We wanted Mute Swans to adorn ponds but when we looked harder, we found an "ugly duckling" that destroys wetlands with feeding habits that increase water turbidity and reduce submerged aquatic vegetation. About the size of our native Trumpeter Swan, Mute Swans are not silent in their defense of territory and demand for the limited marsh space still found in Ohio.

Our speakers will also tell us what steps are being taken to monitor swine and swan and to mitigate their damage, in cooperation with the Ohio Division of Wildlife and other agencies. Ohio Wildlife Services is conducting intense management efforts to reduce damage and loss in southeastern Ohio, and to eliminate newly emergent populations of feral swine in the western and northern portions of the State.

Blackbrook Audubon continues to lead Bird Walks at 8 AM the 4th Sunday of every month through March 2015 at Veterans Park in Mentor. These walks are appropriate for experienced as well as beginning birders of all ages. Veterans Park has woods as well as an inland lake and offers paved trails and restrooms.

We have new Blackbrook Audubon Society hats featuring our owl logo. They are made of waxed cotton and are dark khaki with a brown bill. They cost \$15 each. If you are interested, speak to any officer or board member.

I've decided to discontinue Blackbrook Audubon's printer cartridge recycling program. We just don't collect the volume of cartridges needed to raise money. I find that I have to store the cartridges for many months before I have enough to turn in, and some of them begin to leak and damage the other cartridges in the box. I believe the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo still collects used printer cartridges to raise funds and OfficeMax or Staples offer credit toward future ink purchases, but there are rules as to how their programs work. Best Buy accepts used inkjet cartridges for recycling as well.

Scarecrow Row

Blackbrook Audubon has been invited to build a scarecrow for the Holden Arboretum's Goblins in the Garden event. A couple years ago, we built our first ever "scary crow" for the contest and much to our surprise, we WON first place in the People's Choice category! Our scarecrow had "feathers" on his head (rhododendron leaves painted black and glued to a large flower pot) as well as on his "hands". He stood over 6 feet tall and wore binoculars around his neck.



We will need to use reusable and recyclable materials, including plant matter for all aspects of our scarecrow. The scarecrow will need to stand up to weather conditions, including rain, dew and wind for up to two weeks. We need donations of appropriate materials such as clothing, gloves, and stuffing material (although newspaper and water soluble packing peanuts won't work well).

We also need volunteers who have time to get together late in September to help assemble the Blackbrook Audubon scarecrow. Members of our assembly crew will each receive a pass to attend the Goblins in the Garden event at the Holden Arboretum from 10 AM to 5 PM on Saturday, October 4th and Sunday, October 5th.
