Northeast Ohio's lakefront is a haven for a huge influx of wintering gull species whose identification drives birders to distraction. Noted Cleveland area birder and accomplished avian photographer Chuck Slusarczyk, Jr. highlights defining fieldmarks and tips to help gain proficiency with gull identification as birders prepare for the annual blizzards of gulls along Lake Erie.

Born in Phoenix, AZ, but raised in the Cleveland, OH area, Chuck Sluscarczyk, Jr. is a life-long birder and wildlife photographer with a recent passion for gulls. He enjoys teaching new birders through his easy-going style and having fun along the way. His interest in birds began at a very young age, even before attending his first bird walks in 1975. The Cleveland Audubon Society honored him with an award at age 15 for "Outstanding Contribution in the Field of Conservation", and he won a bird identification contest sponsored by the Cleveland Museum of Natural History in the same year.

SEPTEMBER ACTIVITY

By mid-September, fall migration is in full swing! We'll spend the morning at Lake Metroparks Lake Erie Bluffs in Perry. These 600+ acres along Lake Erie offer a variety of habitats: old fields, woodlands, natural bluffs and shoreline. The south shore of Lake Erie is a rest stop for birds

crossing the lake, where they can find food and rest up for the remainder of their flight south. Many species fly along the lakeshore rather than cross the lake, and large numbers are often seen flying overhead.



Lake Erie Bluffs is the focus of several current projects. The reservable three-season shelter with flush restrooms at the Lane Road parking area is nearly complete at this printing. An observation deck along the trail -- near the location where last year's Northern Shrike was regularly seen -- is complete. Over the next year or so there will also be a pedestrian bridge connecting the Lane Road parking area with the Clark Road parking area. And we all look forward to a multi-story observation tower to be built at the Clark Road parking area. Lots of changes – stop by often to see the progress! Remember to dress for the weather – the winds along the lake can be quite cool this time of year.

DIRECTIONS: From the west, take Route 2 east to

its end, when you will be on Route 20 east. Turn left on Lane Rd. and follow it to the end, where you will find the Lake Erie Bluffs/Lane Road entrance.

Whether you're interested in birding or just want to see the beautiful fall colors, The Holden Arboretum is the place to be in autumn! Covering 3,600 acres, The Holden Arboretum is among the largest arboreta in the United States. Documenting more than 120,000 plants, Holden's horticultural focus is on a recognized collection of trees and shrubs, which are displayed in gardens accompanied by groundcovers and perennials, and in themed collections.

Named as an Important Bird Area by National Audubon Society, with more than 20 miles of hiking trails, Holden is a haven for birds. Since its inception, 218 species of birds have been reliably reported at The Holden Arboretum. Of the 218 total, 93 are confirmed nesting species.

Admission to The Holden Arboretum will be waived. However canopy walk and tower will have a fee of \$4.00 for both. Tickets are first come first serve. No group tickets are available.

DIRECTIONS:

Take Route 306 south past Route 90. Continue on Route 306 to the bottom of the hill. Turn left on Route 615. At the first traffic light, turn right on Kirtland-Chardon Road. Travel 3.6 miles to Sperry Road. Turn left on Sperry Road. Travel 1.4 miles, turn left on main drive to reach the Warren H.

FROM the DESK of the PRESIDENT

Although I haven't seen "my" Baltimore Orioles for a few years, a female Ruby-throated Hummingbird was a daily visitor at my feeder this summer. Sometimes she had a friend with her, and in August, I noticed three hummingbirds hovering and chasing each other in the yard. They all appear to be females, but I suppose they could be young males who have not yet developed the trademark red throat. The male Ruby-throated Hummingbirds will migrate first, with the females following a few weeks to a month later. Folklore says we should take down our hummingbird feeders, otherwise we encourage the birds to stay and freeze to death. Research tells us now that the migration is triggered by day length. If we leave our hummingbird feeders up until late in the fall, we are helping migrating stragglers who otherwise might have trouble finding something to eat during their journey to Central America.


Another migration rite is the sight of Tundra Swans. I most often see them at night. I think they sound like someone is having a party with people laughing and talking and dogs barking, until I realize the sound is coming toward me from the sky and I look up to see large white birds flying overhead in a "V" formation. Sometimes they number just a few dozen, other times, there are hundreds of them.

Hundreds of millions of birds are killed every year during migration when they strike tall buildings. Harvey Webster of the Cleveland Museum of Natural History has told us about the "Smart Light Safe Flight" initiative to encourage building owners to turn off decorative exterior lighting, dim lobby and atrium lighting and to turn off interior lights or draw blinds during peak migration. So far, the Terminal Tower on Cleveland's Public Square and the Fifth Third Center on Superior Avenue have agreed to participate. This year's Monarch butterfly migration is expected to be the best we've seen since 2011. The growing conditions for milkweed and nectar plants have been favorable this summer and we are seeing more Monarch caterpillars and butterflies than the past few years. Hopefully, we will see migrating Monarchs roost together overnight before continuing their journey to Mexico.

Doris Killinen McKinven Bird Collection

A collection of bird figurines in glass, ceramics, metal and wood, which belonged to Doris (nee Killinen) McKinven (November 4, 1919-July 1, 2014) has been donated by her children to the Blackbrook Audubon Society in her memory, to support the work of the chapter. Doris was born and grew up in Fairport Harbor, OH, and returned with her husband, John, to live in Fairport in 2002. Because she loved birds throughout her life, her three children would frequently gift her with a bird figurine from their travels abroad. Her collection includes birds from Austria, France, Mexico, England, Denmark, and beyond. Doris particularly loved owls, and so there are a number of owl figurines. At her request, her husband made a framed sign in calligraphy with the words: "A computer cannot make a bird's nest. "The sign has also been donated to the chapter.

GEO is the Ohio Chapter of the American Solar Energy Society (ASES) - GEO's 13th Annual Tour is part of the ASES National Solar Tour


