Each spring tens of thousands of raptors soar overhead on the northern leg of their migration. Despite doing this in broad daylight, this amazing parade goes, for the most part, unnoticed. Gary will not only describe the phenomenon of raptor migration but define the weather patterns and viewing locations that will allow for the best hawk watching. He will also cover the basics of hawk identification.

Gary S. Gerrone is a Naturalist, Writer, Musician, Bird Caller, Father of Twins, and a Relator of Things. He served as the awardwinning Naturalist Supervisor for most of his 30+ year career with Lorain County Metro Parks.

Spiders. You either love 'em or hate 'em. Regardless of your outlook on all things arachnid, Nora will help us get into the spirit of the season when she clears up some misconceptions about this popular, spooky Halloween figure. She will share some of the natural history behind the 3,800 species of spiders in North America.

Nora has been a naturalist with Geauga Park District for 20 years, sharing her love of nature with all ages through indoor and outdoor programs. Her special interest in spiders began about 15 years ago when she started learning more about these fascinating creatures. She expanded her arachnid knowledge in 2018 with a week-long spider biology course offered at Ohio State University's Stone Laboratory. She continues to learn more about spiders and share her enthusiasm for them with others.

# **Birding along Lake Erie**

#### SEPTEMBER FIELD TRIP

**DATE:** Saturday, September 16, 2023 **ACTIVITY:** Birds and Butterflies "Big Sit"

**TIME:** 9:00 a.m.

**PLACE:** Headlands Dunes SNP

September is migration season for birds as well as Monarch butterflies! We have a busy day planned. We'll start with coffee and doughnuts and explore the nature preserve looking for fall migrants. Birds and Monarch butterflies navigate across Lake Erie, then stop to rest and refuel as they continue their journey south. For those who prefer, bring your lawn chair to sit and visit with friends new and old while you bird from the picnic area. If we are fortunate, Monarch butterflies may be roosting in clusters not far from the picnic area in front of the nature preserve, and we'll try to tag a few for the MonarchWatch.org citizen's science project.

Bring your binoculars, coffee mug and a lawn chair if you plan to sit. Meet at parking lot P1 at the far eastern end of <u>Headlands Beach State</u> <u>Park</u>, 9601 Headlands Road in Mentor, which shares a common entrance with Headlands Dunes State Nature Preserve at the northern end of State Rt. 44, or Heisley Road.

Bring your binoculars and a spotting scope (if you have one). We will meet at the <u>Vista 1 parking lot</u>, the first pull-off to the right after you enter the park.

## September program continued Hawk Migration from page 1

Gary's writing portfolio includes well over 400 published pieces including his long-running nature column in a newspaper and the book Lorain County Metro Parks: The First 50 Years. Well-known for his bird calls and his historical musical presentations, Gary recently added the title of Park Manager to his resume as he currently manages both Geneva and Headlands Beach State Parks.

### **Carefully Counting Cranes**

The Sandhill Crane, Antigone canadensis, is a threatened species in Ohio. For the third year in a row, volunteers visited wetlands throughout the state where the cranes breed to assess their status here during the Midwest Crane Count. These citizen scientists searched for cranes 6:30 – 8:30 am on Saturday, April 15 in 10-square mile survey blocks. They reported results to eBird. Cranes were observed in 24 of the 30 preselected counties, which were chosen based on the availability of wetland habitat. The Ohio count totaled 357 Sandhill Cranes.

Geauga County had the third highest total with 63 cranes sighted, up from 45 last year. Although two Sandhills were reported in Lake County last year, "they were conspicuously absent from the blocks" searched this year, according to Lake County Count Coordinator Megan Hart. Ashtabula County, also within Blackbrook's coverage area, was not part of the Midwest Crane Count.

The inaugural count for Ohio in 2021 yielded 160 Sandhill Cranes in five counties. Last year's number blossomed to 311 cranes in 26 counties.

If you would like to be part of Ohio's count, contact the coordinator for each county for instructions and a block assignment. Ohio Bird Conservation Initiative lists the coordinators and manages the crane count in Ohio in collaboration with Ohio Division of Wildlife and the International Crane Foundation.

Sandhill Cranes were once extirpated from Ohio. They returned to Wayne County in 1987 and have been slowly multiplying since. You can help Sandhill Cranes find more nesting habitat in Ohio by purchasing an Ohio Wildlife Legacy Stamp or a Federal Duck Stamp.

## October is for pumpkins, Auktober is for auks


You may notice this issue of the Hushwing Herald is dated September/Auktober 2023. "Auktober" popped up on social media some time ago, so joining in the "pun" was appealing. Upon further research, we learned the city of Audubon Park, Kentucky, near the Louisville Zoo, started celebrating Auktoberfest in 2015.

For those who aren't sure what an Auk is, the bird family Alcidae has about two dozen members that are known as the penguins of the north, as they are small seabirds, mostly black and white, who dive for fish and squid. The alcids include auks, guillemots, murres and puffins. The Great Auk, who was flightless, was hunted to extinction in 1844.




## A bird's harrowing migration tale

Numenia and the Hurricane: Inspired by a True Migration Story is a children's picture book that illustrates the challenges shorebirds face during fall migration. It's based on the true story of Hope, a Whimbrel fitted with a trans-mitter at a stopover in Virginia and tracked from 2009 to 2012 on her migration from western Canada to St. Croix in the U.S. Virgin Islands. Scientists, bird watchers and school groups followed Hope's movements even after she lost her transmitter, identifying this long-distance migrant by her coded leg flag, AYY.

Some migrating Whimbrels (*Numenius phaeopus*) make a nonstop overwater flight of 2,500 miles from southern Canada or New England to South America.

<u>Hope's fascinating story</u> is summarized in the book *Numenia and the Hurricane* by Fiona



Halliday, which is available at Morley and Willoughby Public Libraries and other CLEVNET locations.

#### **Exploring Solar and Sustainability**

The American Solar Energy Society's <u>National Solar Tour</u> will be October 6 - 8 this year. There will be open houses throughout the area, two guided bus tours, and an Electric Vehicle Rally.

You will discover how many homes and businesses in the area are harvesting the sun for free, clean electricity. Many people are not only powering their entire home but are also charging their electric cars.

The October 6 tour bus will leave the Willoughby Senior Center at 9:00 am and return at 3:00 pm. It will travel to several renewable energy sites in western Lake and eastern Cuyahoga counties including a stop at an Electric Vehicle Rally at Laketran's Wickliffe Park-n-Ride.

The October 7 bus leaves the Mentor Senior Center at 9:00 am and returns at 3:00 pm. It will give participants the chance to view and discuss solar applications, battery-backup systems and electric cars in the Mentor/Painesville area.

Find out how neighbors and businesses near you have taken advantage of federal tax credits and surprisingly low solar panel prices to achieve energy independence, according to event organizer Tom Rapini.

### **Open House at the Mentor Marsh**

Explore the wild, western end of the Mentor Marsh State Nature Preserve during the Second Saturday Science Open House each month. The normally restricted utility pipeline access path is open 8 am - noon on the second Saturday while a naturalist is there to open the gate by the intersection of Woodridge Lane and Forest Road in Mentor Headlands. ## Styrofoam recycling resumes!

A few years ago, Blackbrook shared information on how you could recycle styrofoam, known as expandable polystyrene in the industry. However, Nova Chemicals in Painesville Township stopped accepting styrofoam at the start of the Covid shutdown and then sold the plant to Styropek.

Styropek recently put the drop-off bin back out in their parking lot for discarded packing styrofoam. When you no longer want fitted packing material, you can take the pieces to 786 Hardy Road, Painesville Township. This is the same road that leads to Painesville Township Park and the Lake Metroparks pier.



Styropek does not accept styrofoam packing peanuts or food containers.


# Special Conservation Anniversaries

# **BACK IN 1973**

- The Cleveland Museum of Natural History and the state of Ohio signed an agreement that made Mentor Marsh State Nature Preserve an Interpretive Nature Preserve. It had been named a State Nature Preserve in 1971.
- \* The International Crane Foundation "hatched" in Baraboo, Wisconsin. Cornell University Ornithology students Ron Sauey and George Archibald envisioned an organization combining research, captive breeding and reintroduction, landscape restoration and education to safeguard the world's 15 crane species. In 1973, the Sauey family rented their horse farm to Ron and George for \$1 a year!

Congress passed the Endangered Species Act. Currently, over 1,600 animals and plants are listed as endangered or threatened in the United States. The ESA has been credited with saving 99% of listed species from extinction over the 50 years. The U.S. Postal Service issued this set of postage stamps to commemorate the anniversary.


