Known for their chattering song and aerial acrobatics, <u>Purple Martins</u> (*Progne subis*) can be seen throughout Ohio during the summer months. Martins in the eastern U.S. are entirely dependent on humans to provide suitable shelter for breeding success. Learn about conservation efforts to protect this joyful songbird, both locally and internationally, with an overview of monitoring efforts at local colonies in Lake County and a look at the martin's wintering grounds in the Amazonas state of Brazil.

ACTIVITY:	Birds and Blooms
TIME:	6:30 p.m.
PLACE:	Eagle Creek State Nature Preserve

Instead of a speaker program meeting inside, we'll have a weekday, evening field trip!

Join us for birds and wildflowers in Portage County at 11027 Hopkins Road, Garrettsville.

A tributary of the Mahoning River, Eagle Creek meanders through a wide floodplain dotted with beaver dams and button bush swamps. Unique trees found here include Cucumber Magnolia and Yellow Birch and <u>eBird</u> shows 151 bird species.

We'll wander through wildflowers that flank the trail as we listen for spring migrants and watch nesting bird behaviors. We'll visit an overlook blind to check for water birds and the small boardwalk through the bog. Trails are primitive like most state nature preserves, with a natural surface and exposed roots. Restrooms are only a couple miles away in Garrettsville. Please RSVP at <u>blackbrookaud@aol.com</u>.

Pre-eclipse Bird Walks

Headlands Dunes State Nature Preserve

Parking lot P1 at the east end of Headlands Beach State Park **Sunday, April 7**

Morning with the birds 8:00 a.m. – 9:30 a.m. Sunset with the Birds 6:30 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. Ohio Division of Natural Areas and Preserves

Temperatures here will be cooler than inland. Dress in layers and wear sturdy footwear for walking in sand. The 1.5-mile walk includes the elevated, ADA-accessible boardwalk. Learn how birds behave prior to the astronomical event.

APRIL FIELD TRIP

DATE:	Saturday, April 27, 2024
ACTIVITY:	Exploring an Expanded Marsh
TIME:	9:30 a.m.
PLACE:	<u>Howard Marsh Metropark</u>

We're due for a visit to Howard Marsh since our first explorations of this Lucas County wetland were in 2019. Since then, they restored more marsh across Howard Road. Let's meet at Lakeland Community College's front parking lot along Rt. 306 at 7:00 a.m. to carpool there, or you can head straight for Howard Marsh, 611 S. Howard Road in Curtice, 43412 for the walk at 9:30 a.m. **RSVP at blackbrookaud@aol.com**.

We documented 27 species in August 2019, including Trumpeter Swans, juvenile Pied-billed Grebes and Short-billed Dowitchers. After taking the bus tour at Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge that October, we stopped at Howard since we were in the neighborhood and picked up the Western Cattle Egret.

Shorebirds like Black-necked Stilt and sandpipers as well as Caspian Terns and Yellowheaded Blackbirds will be on the must-see list during our visit. The park has flush restrooms. Bring binoculars and a spotting scope if available.

<u>Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge</u> will be open that day for <u>wildlife drives</u>. Participants will have the option of seeing what they can find from the comfort of their vehicle along the 7-mile route. Everyone might want to bring a sack lunch and beverage since restaurants are not nearby.

Metroparks Toledo acquired Howard Farms in 2008 and, with the help of several partners and grants, transformed over 700 acres next to Lake Erie back into wetlands. This constituted the single largest wetland restoration project completed under the federal Great Lakes Restoration Initiative. Howard Marsh opened in April 2018. The return of this coastal wetland provides habitat for migrating and nesting birds and offers human visitors recreation activities like birding, fishing, kayaking and hiking.

The <u>second phase</u> of the project opened in October 2022, adding another 250 acres to the west of the first phase. Phase two expanded on the wetlands, but also added upland habitat and trails and restored four miles of deep-water channels for fish habitat and kayaking.

Howard Marsh is next to Metzger Marsh Wildlife Area and a short distance north of Magee Marsh Wildlife Area and Ottawa National Wildlife Refuge, Ohio's only federal refuge. This wetland complex is part of what was the <u>Great Black</u> <u>Swamp</u>, which was drained by 1900.

Join Park Systems and Audubon Chapters in Celebrating Spring Bird Migration

The <u>Cleveland-area Spring Bird Walk Series</u>, now in its 91st year, lets us celebrate the arrival of birds who have migrated back here to nest or are stopping to refuel on their way to breeding sites north. Blackbrook invites everyone to our spring bird walk route at the north end of Mentor Marsh State Nature Preserve and <u>Headlands Beach State</u> <u>Park</u>. Meet in the Zimmerman trailhead parking lot at 9600 Headlands Road, west of Shipman Pond, at 7:30 a.m. on these Sundays: **April 14, 21, 28 and May 5, 12, 19**.

From the bridge over Shipman Pond, we'll be able to see the three nests made by the Marsh Bald Eagle pair, including the active one by Rt. 44. *Notice* - Bald Eagle nest watchers reported the start of incubation behavior by the parents on February 10 and feeding behavior at the end of March. It will be a couple weeks before the eyases (raptor nestlings) are mature enough to be upright so we can see how many there are visible over the top of the nest. <u>Nesting phenology</u> involves a lot of hard work by the parents throughout the process of <u>raising young eagles</u>. On the last Sunday of the Spring Bird Walk Series, May 19, you can go on the walk or perch at our "**Big Sit**" in the picnic area by the entrance to Headlands Dunes State Nature Preserve. Bring a chair, a cup or mug and a potluck brunch item to share, if you'd like, after 8:30 a.m. to the far eastern side of Headlands Beach State Park at parking area P-1. The state park and state nature preserve share a common entrance at the northern terminus of State Route 44 (Heisley Road) in Lake County. Blackbrook will supply coffee as we scan the nearby shrubs and trees for warblers, vireos and other migrants taking a break before they cross the lake. This is a perfect outing for less mobile folks who enjoy group birding. Public restrooms are nearby and so is the entrance to the handicapped-accessible boardwalk to the beach.

April in Ashtabula: evening birding

Let's head out to some Ashtabula birding hotspots and perhaps be the first to add new birds to the list. Join Blackbrook Audubon Volunteer Trevor Wearstler from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on these bird walks, held rain or shine. Each location has parking and primitive restrooms. Trails may be muddy. Pull up a Bench at the Potluck Picnic

Three lakes, three trails and lots of friends to bird with at our annual potluck picnic Tuesday, June 18. Make your way to Geauga Park District's <u>Beartown Lakes Reservation</u> about 6:00 p.m. with your place setting, beverage and a dish to share, if you'd like. After you enter the park at 18870 Quinn Road, Auburn Twp., take a left to find the Minnow Pond Shelter. Blackbrook will bring the hot dogs so we can eat about 6:30 p.m.

We'll bird the 22 acres of open water, mature beech-maple forest and meadow abundant with wildflowers and grasses. Maybe we can add to the 139 species of birds on eBird.

Wildlife Center carefully accepts birds

The Lake Metroparks Wildlife Center has established a quarantine space and procedures to accept injured birds once again for rehabilitation. Due to the presence of <u>Highly Pathogenic Avian</u> <u>Influenza</u> (HPAI) in wild birds and commercial flocks, the Center will only accept birds on a caseby-case basis by appointment. The special Avian Influenza Susceptible Species room and separate personal protective equipment (PPE) for staff are necessary to manage patients and to protect the resident ambassador birds from HPAI.

Lower staffing levels than previous years preclude the Center from taking nestling birds. Sick and injured animals may also be taken to other <u>wildlife rehabilitators with permits</u> in Ohio.

The Center accepts animals by appointment ONLY between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. seven days a week. Call **440-256-1404**, option 2 to describe the animal you found and determine if an appointment is necessary.

Inviting Piping Plovers to Headlands

The 2023 nesting season for the <u>Great Lakes</u> <u>Piping Plover</u> had 80 pairs of this shorebird, the most since <u>they were listed</u> under the Endangered Species Act in 1984. Let's help encourage them to nest at Headlands Dunes State Nature Preserve by respecting the signs posted at either end of the Special Management Area, keeping dogs off the beach and leaving stones and shells in place.





you can apply for a rebate!



Homeowners in eight counties, including Ashtabula, Geauga and Lake, who become Stormwater Stewards by installing rain barrels or rain gardens that meet all program criteria are eligible for the rebate under the <u>Lake Erie</u> <u>Stormwater Stewards Rebate Program</u>. Rain garden rebates are awarded at a rate of \$5 per square foot of rain garden installed, with a maximum rebate of \$1,300. The maximum rain barrel rebate is \$100, not to exceed the costs of the rain barrel installation.

A rain barrel and kits are available through Lake Soil and Water Conservation District, **440-350 – 2730** and through <u>Geauga Soil and Water</u> <u>Conservation District</u>, **440-834-1122**.

To celebrate World Migratory Bird Day, Blackbrook will host a conservation project and we need your help!


Thursday, May 9 6:00 p.m.
